Mining the Quarries to Fund Our Masonic Temple

We begin our eleventh year of publication by continuing to communicate the need for funds to restore and improve our historic Lakewood Masonic Temple. After all, historic preservation was and is the principal reason for establishing our Lakewood Masonic Foundation.

A century ago, the Masons and Eastern Star members in Lakewood were busily going about essentially the same business—raising funds and making plans for the building we call home.

The final payment on the land contract with the Andrews brothers was made on October 6, 1913, freeing the Lakewood Masonic Temple Company's Board of Directors to focus on the designs for the new Temple and the associated fundraising to bring the plans to fruition.

In February 1914 the Board contracted with Bro. Herman H. Patterson to manage a campaign to raise at least \$50,000 for the building fund. Lincoln Chapter OES agreed to serve dinners at each campaign dinner at a cost of 50 cents per meal. By the time of the annual stockholders meeting in early April, the campaign had raised over \$59,000 (nearly \$1.4 million in current dollars); and Lincoln Chapter was reimbursed \$564 for 1,128 dinners. The stockholders agreed to raise the capital stock value of the Company from \$20,000 to \$75,000 (nearly \$1.75 million in current dollars).

By the end of May 1914 the design process was fully underway, and the Board began circulating floor plan drawings for comment.

And, yes, just as our founders and early leaders did nearly a century ago, we continue to ask you,

our members and readers, for your financial support. Many of you have responded favorably. Through the generosity of our donors we have been able to grant funds for critical historic preservation projects such as new rain gutters, new chimney flashing, historically accurate replacement windows, masonry tuck pointing, interior plaster and decorative painting restoration, sun-filtering protective window shades, exterior door replacement, and heating system refurbishment; for education in the form of scholarships; and for charity such as Hurricane Katrina relief.

We are now able to turn our attention to exterior window repairs and painting and the start of interior paint restoration on the Ballroom level.

Making an Honor Gift

Our Lakewood Masonic Foundation provides an easy alternative for you. Consider making "honor gifts" to friends or loved ones who hold a special cause close to their hearts. For Masons and Eastern Star members, that cause may well be our Lakewood Masonic Family.

What is an "honor gift?" It is simply a donation that you make in recognition of someone significant in your life. Honor gifts are often made on traditional occasions but can be made at any time in recognition of a significant achievement or milestone or as a method of saying "congratulations" or "thank you."

The procedure for making an "honor gift" to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation is straightforward. Our donation forms, such as the one on page 11, and our pre-printed donation envelopes have an "Honor" box to check and a space in which to write the name of the person to be honored. In addition to the tax receipt letter that we send you, we will send a letter to each person you honor advising that you have made a gift in his/her name.

As with other gifts, you may designate your donation to be used for our historic preservation, educational or charitable purposes; split your gift among these purposes; or simply ask that it be devoted to our greatest need.

And, as with other gifts, you have a number of options for making your donation, such as by check, stocks or bonds (valued at current fair market value), a life insurance policy that you may no longer need, or a charitable gift annuity or remainder trust.

Your gifts can be directed to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation, to our Lakewood Masonic Temple Endowment Fund or to our Lakewood Masonic Temple Company Operating Fund. Gifts and bequests to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation are deductible for federal income and estate taxes to the extent permitted by law. Gifts to our Endowment and Operating Funds are not deductible. As always, we encourage you to consult your legal and financial advisors for assistance in determining in what form and in what amount you should make your gift or bequest.

In these difficult times, we are stretching our resources more than ever; and your gift to our Lakewood Masonic Foundation means more than ever before. We still have pressing needs if we are to catch up on deferred maintenance by our 100th year. Windows must be repaired and painted, storm windows must be procured, plumbing and electrical systems must be updated, and decorations must be refreshed. We have made significant progress, but there is more to do. Worthy charitable and educational endeavors need our support. Don't delay; make your gift today.

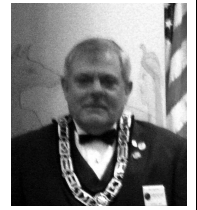
I'm looking forward to a great spring and summer, so be well, and I'll see you in Lodge.

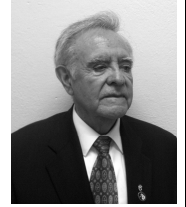

Gates of the Temple

In the system of Freemasonry, the Temple of Solomon is represented as having a gate on the east, west, and south sides but none on the north. In reference to the historical Temple of Jerusalem, such a representation is wholly incorrect. In the walls of the building itself there were no places of entrance except the door of the porch, which gave admission to the house. But in the surrounding courts there were gates at every point of the compass. The Masonic idea of the Temple is, however, entirely symbolic. The Temple is to the Speculative Mason only a symbol not an historical building, and the gates are imaginary and symbolic also. They are, in the first place, symbols of the progress of the sun in his daily course, rising in the east, culminating to the meridian in the south, and setting in the west. They are also, in the allegory of life, which it is the object of the third degree to illustrate, symbols of the three stages of youth, manhood, and old age, or, more properly of birth, life, and death.

In closing I would hope that everyone is enjoying this Masonic year to the fullest. May it carry you all year long.

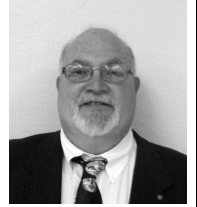

Freemasonry, borrowing its symbols from every source, has not neglected to make a selection of certain parts of the human body. From the back an important lesson is derived, which is fittingly developed in the third degree. Hence, in reference to this symbolism, Oliver says: "It is a duty incumbent on every Mason to support a brother's character in his absence equally as though he were present; not to revile him *behind his back*, nor suffer it to be done by others, without using every necessary attempt to prevent it." And Hutchinson, referring to the same symbolic ceremony, says: "The most material part of that brotherly love which should subsist among Masons is that of speaking well of each other to the world; more especially it is expected of every member of this Fraternity that he should not traduce a brother. Calumny and slander are detestable crimes against society. Nothing can be viler than to traduce a man *behind his back*; it is like the villainy of an assassin who has not virtue enough to give his adversary the means of self-defense, but, lurking in darkness, stabs him whilst he is unarmed and unsuspecting of an enemy."
